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Feb. 15: IRS Filing Deadline

All Kiwanis Clubs are required to file annual tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Tax-exempt organizations whose gross receipts normally are \$50,000 or less are not required to file IRS forms 990 or 990-EZ. But they are required to file an electronic form annually. Failure to file for three consecutive years could result in revocation of the organization's tax-exempt status.

The electronic form is at Form 990-N. The standard information the IRS will

require when filing the electronic Form 990-N is the name of your Kiwanis club, mailing address, Web site address (if applicable), employer identification number (EIN), annual tax period date, and a statement that annual gross receipts are still normally \$50,000 or less.

Because Kiwanis International operates on a fiscal year of Oct. 1 to Sept. 30, the filing due date is Feb. 15 each year.

Suicide Prevention

We are facing a growing crisis. 47,000 people in the United States die each year as a result of suicide and is now the 10th leading cause of death as well as the second leading cause of death among young people 15 to 34. On the surface, this subject has been difficult to talk about and is considered controversial. Why should it be? The push should be to de-stigmatize and increase awareness and conversation.

According to the National Suicide Prevention Hotline, research has shown that people who are having thoughts of suicide feel relief when someone asks them about it in a caring way. Talking about suicide may reduce rather than increase suicide ideation.

The best way to promote awareness of suicide prevention is to start this conversation by educating individuals in Mental Health First Aid. This course aims to preserve life, prevent the problem from becoming more serious, promote recovery, provide comfort and support and help to guide a person to appropriate resources.

Many adults have been trained in CPR and first aid by the American Red Cross. Did you know that you can be trained in Mental Health First Aid? You can make a difference just by taking a Mental Health First Aid course. This course will give you the skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis.

Every 40 seconds someone takes their life. Take 40 seconds and do something. Get involved as an advocate, be a better listener and understand the signs. Have an open and honest conversation and if you do see something, talk to the person and encourage that person to see a mental health professional.

THANK YOU, to all the Kiwanians & Clubs of the New York District Kiwanis for helping Governor Hank reach his goal

of his Governor's Project - "100+ Military Kampers"

Here are the final numbers:

- Total Amount collected \$143,774.
- \$76,430 used in 2019
- \$61,435 in tuition for a total of 139 military kampers.
 - \$14,995 in transportation
 - \$67,344 left to use for 2020

This gives us more than 300 military kampers. Just outstanding and fantastic.

Last year the Kamp experienced a decline of 100 traditional kampers as clubs concentrated on supporting the effort for military kampers. This equates to a loss of 17 percent of traditional kampers, which equate to a loss of \$46,500 in revenue.

This year the goal is not have the Kamp experience any decline but have an increase in traditional kamperships.

Gov. Joe is continuing the program for the 2019-20 year with some enhancements. He has expanded the program to include the children of first responders and fallen heroes.

Also, an International Exchange program is being developed to bring children from other countries to our Kamp.

The cost this year to send a child to Kamp is \$625. (\$475 for tuition and \$150 for transportation.)

With a concentrated effort we can achieve these goals which are:

- Bring the Kamp back to capacity
- Send more Military Kampers
- Give children of first responders and fallen heroes a gift of Kamp Kiwanis.

Seeing how this is the season of giving and helping people in need I thought that I would share with you a letter (which is one of many that) I receive from the parents receiving our grants through the generosity of Kiwanis. It reads as follows:

Dear John:

It has been several months now since we have been receiving assistance from the Pediatric Lyme Disease Foundation for our daughter Alexis. The transactions and reimbursements to providers have been flawless and they are reimbursed very quickly, within a weeks time. This has been a true blessing for our family. It has done a lot to ease the financial burden during a difficult time. We realize the grant cannot continue unending, we truly appreciate this assistance. It's a

shame that chronic Lyme treatment is not recognized by much of the medical community and that treatment cannot be covered by traditional medical insurance.

Much of our days are spent with many symptoms. We are unable to have or experience what most families have. Born in 1915, Kiwanis began its evolution from an organization of Benevolent Order Brothers (a/k/a "BOB") to one that includes member clubs for ages nine to 90-plus with a primary mission to serve the needs of children, locally and globally.

the role of New York District Historian previously held by the late Kiwanis International President Anton J. "Tony" Kaiser (1987-88) and Past International President Gerald P. "Jerry" Christiano (1996-97), who now resides and is an active Kiwanian in Naples, Florida.

International Conventions Have Changed Over the Years

Perhaps nowhere else in the history of Kiwanis is there reflected more evidence of changing times and changing attitudes than in the story of the organization's conventions. Early sessions reflected the understandable need to set up a better structure for the organization to ensure its success. But over the years, fellowship became more and more prominent, and elaborate programs of entertainment were eagerly anticipated by convention-goers.

Early in the organization's history, con-

vention sites were rotated among established Kiwanis regions, but by the 1950s it became evident that only a limited number of cities could host a Kiwanis International convention. Now made four to five years in advance, the selection of a convention city focuses more on available facilities.

tory, these speakers have included the Honorable Angus MacDonald, premier of Nova Scotia (1934); US Federal Bureau of Investigation Director, J. Edgar Hoover (1936); US Vice-President Richard Nixon; Christian evangelist Dr. Billy Graham; Roman Catholic Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen; TV personality Art Linkletter, and US President Ronald Reagan.

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Plan Early for 2020 International Convention

The 2020 Kiwanis International Convention will be in Indianapolis June 18-21.

Registration is expected to open on Jan. 15. Early Bird registration (until April 10) is \$399. The cost rises \$100 until May 22, and \$100 more after May 22 when on-site registration will be required.

A lineup of speakers at the convention has been announced. Among those appearing are Ethan Zohn, winner of the CBS television show "Survivor: Africa". A former professional soccer player, after his win, he co-founded Grassroot Soccer.

In 2009, Zohn was diagnosed with

Hodgkin's Lymphoma.

Also speaking will be Captain "Sully" Sullenberger, the pilot who landed a US Airways plane on the Hudson River in New York City on Jan. 15, 2009. Also appearing will be Kevin Carroll, a spokesman for advancing education, sports and play as a vehicle for social change.

The convention will offer something new. On Wednesday, June 17, there will be a pre-conference Education Conference. For an additional \$99 fee, participants can choose from tracks for District Coordinators and Chairs Training; Influential Lieutenant Governors; Make an Impact During Your Club Presidency; Club Membership Summit and Unleash Your Inner Leader.

The Education Conference will continue on Thursday, June 18, the first day of the convention. Several training sessions will be available. Be sure to look when you register for the convention at various options for the additional cost of participating in the education conference.

Kiwanis International has stated that clubs are free to pay the cost of members' participation in the Education Conference from the club's Project Account.

Kiwanis International has picked the JW Marriott as the hotel for the New York District. It is connected by a sky bridge to



the Convention Center.

International also is sponsoring convention trips, including one pre-convention trip which may not have much attraction to New York Kiwanians. The five-day trip from June 11-15 is to New York City. The other is a post-convention, eight-day trip to Nashville, New Orleans and Memphis. Details on those trips is on the Kiwanis International web site.

House of Delegates action will include election of International Vice President Peter Mancuso as president-elect for 2020-21. Elected vice president last June, he will not face any opposition as he moves to the post of president-elect.

There currently are five candidates for vice president for the coming year, including Ernest Schmid of the Austria District, who currently is the counselor to the New York District. Also running are Chuck Gugliuzza of Florida; Richard Olmstead of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District, Bert West of the Rocky Mountain District and Terry White of the Indiana District.

The excitement on both girls' faces does not require explanation. I'd guess that nine years later both of them remember that day. And I think people looking at the picture understand the essence of what that day's event was about.

As someone who has taken thousands of pictures over the years, I know there is an element of good luck in getting such a shot. The photographer had to be in the right place at the right time and ready to get the photo. And they had the skill needed to get the shot.

It's been 10 years since the district began asking clubs and divisions to send their pictures for display on the web site. In the first couple years, I often had to fight with pictures taken with phones which were of poor quality and difficult to do anything with. Newer phones with much better cameras ended that, but I still get too many pictures of groups of



people staring at the camera.

I believe that pictures like the one shown here tells more about Kiwanis and what we are about than a shot of a group of people in a chorus line.

At times, such as handing out awards, it's difficult to do anything else and I understand that. But often the pictures of fund raising events or community projects come to me the same way. Taking a picture of all the volunteers when an event is over is not the best way to tell the story of what happened. Compare the picture above to what would have resulted had the submitted picture been of all the students lined up and looking at the camera.

As webmaster I edit submitted pictures

in an effort to make the best presentation possible. But I can't do anything with the picture that wasn't taken.

Try to get people carrying out the project or at work on the fund raising event in your pictures. Pictures lose a lot of interest to me if people are looking at the camera instead of paying attention to what they are doing.

Clubs that submit pictures to the district web site often are submitting them to their local newspapers as well. All newspapers are short of staff and time now, and if you can send them a picture which will attract a lot of attention, you may find that you get better presentation which will give your club the attention you are looking for.
