In-person attendance will be determined by capacity limits established by local and state officials and is first come, first

Kiwanis International has adopted the meeting guidelines of the World Health Organization (WHO) and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). We intend to meet or exceed every rule for pre-meeting testing and preparation and will follow guidelines for sug-gested spacing and social distancing during meals and meetings.

All attendees must attest that they have been fully vaccinated as defined by the CDC or have received a negative COVID-19 test result within five days of the first day that the attendee will be attending meetings.

All attendees attending the meetings shall sign a waiver of COVID-19 claims.

Any attendee who has tested positive for COVID-19 is prohibited from attending the meetings unless they provide proof of two negative tests after contracting COVID-19.

Any attendee who is not fully vaccinated and has been knowingly exposed to an individual who has tested positive for COVID-19 within 14 days prior to the meetings is prohibited from attending the meetings.

All attendees agree to undergo a temperature test prior to the beginning of any meeting. Any attendee who has a temperature higher than 100.3 degrees Fahrenheit will be excluded from attending the meetings in person, but may attend virtu-

All attendees agree to wear face coverings while attending the meetings and in common spaces.

All attendees agree to abide by strict social distancing protocols established by the hotel and Kiwanis.

Spring is finally here and with that we have completed half of our 2020-21 Kiwanis year.

The year of a continuing pandemic has certainly been different than any of us could ever have imagined. However, this pandemic cannot and will not hinder the community service and outreach of New York Kiwanians.

Throughout the year, I have been contacted by many club presidents, club secretaries and lieutenant Governor's regarding the Governor's Project. A leading question has been, "Are clubs ex-

pected to fulfill every aspect of the Governor's Project?" The answer to this question is, "No, each club may complete ANY aspect of the Governor's Disaster Relief Project."

Divisions within the district have varying community needs, members must determine what this need is and continue from there. My home club, Minisink Valley in the Hudson River West Division, has realized the continued need for necessities in the areas four food pantries.

The Governor's Project has three categories of which you may choose to fulfill the requirements and thus receive the Governor's Award for your club. These categories are emergency training, emergency kits and non-perishable food collection

Training may consist of CPR, NARCAN, Stop the Bleed, First Aid or Emergency Preparedness.

Emergency Kits may be created to fulfill a need within your community or to be

stored in the District's Disaster Relief area, for use during a more widespread disaster.

Components for these kits are many: food, first aid, toiletries, cleaning items and activities for children, to help them cope with a disaster and embrace a sense of normality.

Non-perishable food items may be donated to a family in need, local food pantry or the District's Disaster Relief storage area.

#### **Preventing Tick Bites**

1. Know where to expect ticks - Ticks live in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas, or even on animals. Spending time outside walking your dog, camping, gardening, or hunting could bring you in close contact with ticks. Many people get ticks in their own yard or neighborhood.

2. Treat clothing and gear with products containing 0.5% permethrin. Permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing, and camping gear and remain protective through several washings. Alternatively, you can buy permethrin-treated clothing and gear.

- 3. Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) registered insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (OLE), para-menthane-diol (PMD), or 2-undecanone. EPA's helpful search tool can help you find the product that best suits your needs. Always follow product instructions. Do not use products containing OLE or PMD on children under three years of age.
- 4. Avoid contacts with ticks. Avoid wooded and brushy areas with high grass and leaf litter and walk in the center of trails.

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1. Check your clothing for ticks. Ticks may be carried into the house on clothing. Any ticks that are found should be removed. Tumble dry clothes in a dryer on high heat for at least ten minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors. If the clothes are damp, additional time may be needed. If the clothes require washing first, hot water is recommended. Cold and medium temperature water will not kill ticks.

2. Examine gear and pets. Ticks can ride into the home on clothing and pets, then attach to a person later. So carefully examine pets, coats, and day packs.

3. Shower soon after being outdoors. Showering within two hours of coming indoors has been shown to reduce your risk of getting Lyme disease and may be effective in reducing the risk of other tickborne diseases. Showering may help wash off unattached ticks and it is a good opportunity to do a tick check.

4. Check your body for ticks after being outdoors. Conduct a full body check upon return from potentially tick-infested areas, including your own backyard. Use a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body, and check these parts of your body and your child's body for ticks: under your arms, in and around your ears, inside belly button, back of knees, in and around the hair, and between the legs.

Each year state and local health departments report cases of Lyme disease to CDC through a passive reporting system, the National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System. This system provides vital, detailed information for monitoring the geographic, seasonal and demographic features of Lyme disease in the United States. However, because it is a passive system that relies on busy health care pro-

vides to submit records, many cases do not get reported. Having said that, if you think you or your child has gotten bit a by tick go to your doctor (preferably a Lyme Literal Doctor (LLD) immediately and demand a blood test and to be put on antibiotics. Do not wait for the blood test come back, that may be to late. Remember when it comes to Lyme disease "TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE".

For the last year raising funds and receiving donations has been slow at best and none at worst. If you or your club can see a way to make a donation to the Lyme Foundation or purchase a Brittany Fellowship, one of our Emerald Awards, or a Joseph Michael West Fellowship, please do, as this is the only way we receive funds.

We need the funds to help pay for the treatment and/or medication of a child with Chronic Lyme Disease.

Rose Marie and I want to say "Thank You" to the most generous people that we know, and belong to the greatest community service organization in the world, Kiwanis.

On a lighter note, mark your calendars. The new date for the Lyme Gala is December 5, 2021, at the Floral Terrace, 250 Jericho Turnpike in Floral Park. District Historian

Having just celebrated "Women's History Month", this may be a good time to look back on the historic 1987 "amendment to the amendment" that dramatically and beneficially changed the history of Kiwanis.

Members know that Kiwanis began in January 1915 in the context of a fraternal and business-oriented society when few if any raised questions about the gender of club members. But how many of us knew that the provision restricting membership to males only was not codified until almost a decade later in the organization's newly adopted Constitution and Bylaws?

One can speculate that the Women's Suffrage Movement, a movement that had its greatest strength in New York State, influenced Kiwanis leaders to spell out, specifically, restrictions on membership in local clubs. In New York State in 1925, there were well over two dozen Kiwanis clubs with all male members - a rather potent voting block at upcoming national conventions able to protect the status quo.

Fifty years later, in response to the Women's Rights Movement of the sixties and seventies, almost every Kiwanis International convention had an amendment presented in its House of Delegates to admit women to full membership. In 1976, there was even a proposal to grant women "honorary membership" which many viewed as a hollow attempt to "get

a foot in the door for change" or worse, a demonstrable lack of courage to "do the right thing" immediately. For opposite reasons, honorary membership status had the effect of uniting both adversaries and proponents of female membership.

Angered by what soon became a "cause celebre", delegates at ensuing Kiwanis International conventions engaged in heated debates over amendments, and amendments to amended amendments, that failed repeatedly to reach the necessary two-thirds vote for passage. This forced defiant clubs to take bold new steps to admit women.

One such New York club was the Kiwanis Club of Great Neck, but as long as Kiwanis International continued to threaten charter revocation, defiant clubs faced the Hobson's choice between submission, camouflaging the names of women listed on their membership rosters, or initiating legal action.

In 1985, legal action was taken by one woman, Marcia Baer, representing the Kiwanis Club of Ridgewood, New Jersey. Via a television broadcast, Baer announced she was bringing a lawsuit against Kiwanis International to strike down the bylaw provision restricting club membership to men only. Other lawsuits followed, including those filed against Rotary and Lions International.

With the mounting expense of litigation and negative publicity, not to mention prolonged and divisive battles at local club board meetings, the "amendment as amended" to allow women to become full-fledged members in "all Kiwanis clubs throughout the world" was finally passed. It gained the necessary two-thirds majority vote at the 1987 Kiwanis International convention in Washington, DC. Was it providential that an unusually large

crowd of news reporters were on site to hear the convention's speaker, President Ronald Reagan, as well as to announce the consequential vote in the House of Delegates?

Within the following two years, more than 10,000 women were officially enrolled as Kiwanians, including many Kiwanis spouses who for years were already doing the "heavy lifting" in their local Kiwanis clubs. Far more important than any revenue-raising membership gain, the admission of women prompted Kiwanis leaders to develop a more focused and consistent "major emphasis" program, one which to this day, brands Kiwanis distinctively as the leading service organization "Serving the Children of the World."

In the next edition of this column, we will review how Circle K and Key Club overcame Kiwanis resistance to become co-ed organizations, recalling courageous and lesser known efforts made by several New Yorkers in the early 1970's.

### Kiwanians of the Year Honored

Over several years Carmen Mastroianni and Bob Teesdale have been Kiwanis representatives and Board Members of the Kommunity Youth Activity Center (KYAC) in Old Forge.

Carmen, a Kiwanis member since 2012, and Bob, a member since 2010, have devoted many hours to the organization and management of KYAC. Improvements in the facility and financial condition of the organization have been just a small part of their contribution to the children of their Central Adirondacks.

### **Public Supports East Meadow Food Drive**

The Kiwanis Club of East Meadow held a food drive outside of the ShopRite in Uniondale. Seven truckloads of nonperishable food and 54 gift cards were collected for local pantries with monetary donations amounting to \$545.
